Forgotten History by Jeff Jaax

About nine months ago I purchased an album containing a number of first day covers. Included in this album was this cachet.



I was intrigued. Who was Anton Cernak and what was the significance of the cryptic "I am glad it was me instead of you!" quotation? Using google, I discovered that Anton Cernak was born in Austria-Hungary (now Czechoslovakia) in 1873. He spent his first birthday in Elllis Island when his family emigrated to the United States. They eventually settled in central Illinois with his father becoming a coal miner.

When Cernak turned 15, he also became a coal miner. When the miners went on strike a year later, Cernak moved to Chicago. He became a stableboy for the horse-drawn streetcar company. He saved his money and was able to purchase a horse and cart a year later. He began selling firewood. With his profits, Cernak expanded to start a successful trucking business.

With his success, Cernak became involved in Chicago politics. Because of his ethnic background, he was able to garner the support of the large Eastern European population. As a member of the Democrat Party, Cernak was elected the Mayor of Chicago in 1930. As mayor, Cernak pushed for job creation for Poles, Czechs, Germans, and the increasing black communities. Because of this, many in the black community left the Republican Party and joined the Democrat Party.

In 1933, Cernak traveled to Miami, Florida to meet with the President-Elect Franklin Roosevelt. Roosevelt was to be inaugurated two weeks later. As Cernak was shaking Roosevelt's hand, Guiseppe Zangara tried to assassinate Roosevelt. He fired five shots at Roosevelt. Roosevelt was unhurt but Anton Cernak was struck in the chest. Roosevelt cradled the mortally wounded Cernak in his arms as they were rushed to the hospital. Cernak's final words were to Roosevelt "I'm glad it was me instead of you!"


Editor's Note:

IF Zangara had successfully assassinated Franklin Roosevelt, with the inauguration 17 days away, who would become President? John Nance Garner was Roosevelt's running mate and became his first Vice but does that qualify him to become President if the President elect dies before the inauguration. An interesting Constitutional question. It would have been much more of a "Constitutional Crisis" than the made up ones of the last few years by the media and political pundits.

The Three Cent Stamp of the United States 1851-1857 Issue CARROLL CHASE TATHAM STAMP AND COIN COMPANY 1942 374 PAGES

This book documents just about everything known about this issue. It begins with explaining why this stamp was produced and preceded into the various design features encountered in the proofs. The bulk of this book delves into the 11 specific plates produced during the six year production run of the 3 cent stamp. This includes detailed descriptions of the early, intermediate, and late versions of each plate. The types of paper and gum are also briefly examined. The book concludes by examining the known cancellations encountered in this issue. This book is a comprehensive study and would be useful for the philatelist specializing in this series.

New Product to the Stamp Trade to Detect Watermarks:

Wayne Youngblood was demonstrating and selling a product that has been out for some time in craft market. It has only recently been found to be useful by our philatelic community. Un-du Original Formula Sticker, Tape and Label Remover will remove any label and any self-adhesive stamp from paper while leaving no residue like Goo Gone or other products out on the market. You can remove the stamp and then reapply or you can remove the adhesive completely with the application of more product.

The real beauty of this product is it will also detect watermarks. And it does not evaporate quickly. So those really hard to detect watermarks as on the Washington-Franklins, you can really study and probably identify accurately as never before.

Wayne was selling it for \$12 or \$13 for a 4 oz. bottle. It is currently selling on Amazon for \$15.29 or a 2pk for \$23.99.

Since it leaves no residue it is much safer to use on your stamps and it has a dual use. Try it out.



Dead Countries: Stamp Issuing Countries That No Longer Exist by Neil Becker

#12 Palestine

You can fly northeast from the Philippines or southeast from Japan about the same distance to find the Mariana Islands. These 14 volcanic islands run in a string north of Guam. The largest is less than 46 square miles in area and has around 43,000 residents. Only three other islands in the string are inhabited; the other ten have active volcanos. They, along with Guam, are currently U.S. Territories.

The Mariana Islands were discovered by a Spanish ship in 1521 and formally claimed as a colony of Spain in 1667. As a result of the Spanish-American War, Spain ceded all their Pacific Ocean islands (except Guam), but including the Marianas for 837,500 Gold German Marks (a little over 4 million U.S.

dollars at that time) in 1899. After WWI the Treaty of Versailles stripped Germany of all her colonies and the Mariana Islands were placed under the trusteeship of Japan. The U.S took over administration as a territory after WWII.

The postal history of the Mariana Islands Is rather simple for the stamp collector. Until 1899 stamps of the Philippines were valid for postage. Immediately prior to the transfer to Germany, six values of the Philippines 1898 issue were hand-stamped "Marianas Española" in two lines inside a box. These stamps were only valid for use on a single mailing from the Island of Saipan to Manila in December 1899.

The first stamps as a colony of Germany were from their 1889-90 issue, overprinted "Marianen", at a 48 degree angle, in 1899 (Scott 11a-16a). A new printing in May, 1900 placed the angle of the overprint at 56 degrees (Scott 11-16). There were six values overprinted from 3pf to 50pf.

The "Kaiser's Yacht" stamps were put into use in 1901 with thirteen values. They were in use up to 1919. A 3ph (1919) and a 5m (1916) were printed

on lozenges watermarked paper but were never placed in use.

Subsequent postage use was from Japan (1919-1945) and the United States (1945-present).

U.S. Fancy Cancels:

Found a nice copy of U.S. #36 with a red fancy cancel at Chicagopex. It is quite vivid and striking. So of course, I had to have it. Besides I didn't own this particular Scott #.

Fancy cancels are a fascinating facet of philately. If you would like to know more there are several books of the subject or you can go to

https://stampsmarter.org/features/Home_Features.html and towards the bottom of the page is a section called "Cancels and Markings". There are two data bases on fancy cancels. One is 1870-1894 cancels and the other is 1895 to present.
