Bob Baltzell served as President and most recently as Historian for the MPS. He was a passionate and knowledgeable philatelist. Once he completed his United States collection, he sold it and started another collecting passion. Fascinated with Franklin Roosevelt, he started a collection around the President. He was researching and working on a book about the Roosevelt stamp collection with Bob Burney until he fell ill and Bob B. passed away.

Bob was a long time member of The American Philatelic Society. He was also an exhibitor, winning a award at the APS show in Omaha in 2019 on his exhibit about Franklin Roosevelt. He won a Large Vermeil for *Franklin Delano Roosevelt—A Gifted Collector*. The exhibit above was a club exhibit in December 2019 titled *Stamp Secrets Hiding in Plain Sight*.

Bob was born in Los Angeles, CA but lived in Kansas City metro for many years with his wife Jan where they raised their family. They have lived in Independence for the past 40 years.



Pan American Airways Postal Rates 1935-1941 by Michael Keil

With the introduction of air service from the continental United States across the Pacific Ocean to the Far East, new postal rates were established and new stamps issued. Initially the postal rate was set at 25 cents per half ounce per leg of the route from San Francisco to Manila. However this caused some confusion as there were actually 5 stops, not 3. The legs of the journey were, San Francisco to Hawaii; Hawaii to Midway Island; Midway to Wake Island; Wake to Guam; and Guam to Manila. But because Midway and Wake Islands had no postal facilities, they were not included in the rates. Service was initially scheduled to begin November 8, 1935, but under pressure from the philatelic community it was pushed back to November 22 to allow collectors time to prepare covers for the inaugural flight.




First flight cover from San Francisco to Honolulu (back stamped) franked with the new 25 cent Trans-Pacific stamp (Scott C20).




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Beginning in early 1937 air service was extended from Manila to Macao and Hong Kong, requiring a rate change and new stamps. The new rate from Manila to Macao or Hong Kong was twenty cents with the new stamp being issued on February 15, 1937. The previous 25 cent rate was also reduced to 20 cents. The same day a new 50 cent stamp was issued to cover the rates from the US to Manila and between Hawaii and Hong Kong and Macao. The total rate from the U.S. mainland to Hong Kong and/or Macao was set at 70 cents.




First flight from Hawaii to Macao with the new 50 cent air mail stamp (Scott C22).

#12 Palestine

Palestine's postal history began with the Ottoman Empire with a postal system created in 1834. The postage stamps later created by the Ottomans were valid up to 1917. During the later portions of that period, foreign post offices (including Austria, France, Germany, Italy, Russia and Egypt) were allowed in major Palestine cities.

In 1917, the British Egyptian Expeditionary Force (EEF) occupied Palestine and took over the administration of the area. The first postage stamps (1 Piastre, and 5 Millièmes) were issued in February 1918, lithographed, and rouletted 20. The 1pi was printed in two different shades of blue. The 5m was overprinted on the 1p ultramarine issue.

Later in 1918 eleven denominations (1m thru 20pi) were printed using the same design, typographed, perf. 15x14. These stamps were valid throughout the entire occupied middle-east including

Trans-Jordan, Lebanon, Syria and the Sinai.

The League of Nations Mandate for Palestine of 1920 established the British administration in Palestine up to 1948. 1920-21 saw the Jerusalem printing of four different PALESTINE overprints on the EEF design with "Palestine" in Arabic, English and Hebrew. The variations included changes in the Arabic and spacing between the three inscriptions. Two printings from London in 1921 and 1922 showed (most notably) "Palestine" in non--serif font. In addition the 1922 printing was on watermark 4 paper.



Finally, Postage Due stamps were issued in 1923 (five denominations), 1924 (six denominations) and in 1928-1945 (nine denominations). [Note: The J9 image shown as "specimen" was the only one found. I don't even own any of that set.1

#s 15-25 In 1927 Palestine finally got its own stamps – a set of 22 definitives depicting four historic places. The denominations 50 mils to 1 Palestine pound were presented in a larger format. All these served the state until the end of the Mandate when the new state of Israel was formed in 1948.
