Philatelic Ramblings:

The heat is back on! The church got the furnace fixed. It was working the other night when I was at a meeting in Westminster Hall. And recently at that church meeting, I had an epiphany. We were discussing the declining membership and what to do about it. Some members were lamenting the lack of young families. But as I looked around the room, I realized that where we had growth in the past few years was in people over 50 years of age. This seems to be a trend in the traditional churches nationally. Young families and singles have not found the need or desire to belong to a church or they join some mega-church for a time, where they can be anonymous. My epiphany or discovery, realization was that this is not confined to the church today. How many younger people belong to the Lions, Rotary, Kiwanis or similar organization? Not many, those organizations are struggling also.

We have the same problem in the world of philately. But yet, we bemoan the fact that we can not get our kids, grandkids or other younger people interested in our world of stamps. Although, we have sustained our membership with older individuals that have either come back to the hobby later in life or have found a new interest to fill their time. Perhaps we should be targeting those that are over 50 and forget about the youth. Their interests just don't align with our world. There are many reasons for that and we are not about to solve those cultural differences. Start thinking about how we should be reaching out to our older population. I know that we can grow this club by focusing on this age group.

I talked with a member of the Wichita Stamp Club at the recent Wichita show. They are struggling in leadership but yet they have 70 some members. They currently have no secretary and they have not produced a newsletter in over a year. Yet they mount two bourses each year. Increasing membership should solve our leadership problem if people that join are willing to step up. Organizations require leadership or they will die. The organization doesn't run itself. I appreciate that Perry has stepped up to fill in as secretary on a temporary basis. If we can't talk Perry into filling that roll on a permanent basis then one of you must step up. It is not a difficult position but it is important for the record and history of the club. It is also required to keep our non-profit status. By the way, thanks Perry, you are doing a great job!

Every where I turn, counterfeit stamps is all the talk. The biggest concern is how "perfect" they are becoming. Older counterfeit stamps were fairly easy to detect. But with new printing methods, they are getting better and better. Will the USPS step up their enforcement and stop the flood of counterfeits or will they give up and continue to absorb their losses. Or will they just stop producing stamps all together and force you to the post office to get your letter or package metered.

After collecting new issues, singles and plate blocks for nearly sixty years, I decided with my recent retirement to quit collecting the new issues. I have not liked most of the new issues for many years and the expense of collecting them is just not in the budget right now. I know many of you decided that many years ago. It has been a hard decision to make but this way I can focus on other areas of my collections. Who knows, I may change my mind later. I can always catch back up, through dealers like fellow member Scott of Tiger Collectibles. And my suggestion if you decide to buy the newer U.S. issues, either buy from the USPS or from a dealer like Scott. Otherwise, you could end up with counterfeit issues in your collection and not know it.

Flight of the DO-X (German Dornier Seaplane by Rick Karlslyst:

In 1925 Germany's Dornier Flugzeugwerke started building the worlds largest seaplane. It was completed in July 1929. Her 70th flight was in Oct of 1929, and 169 people were aboard her for the flight. Due to Versailles Treaty restrictions it was technically built on Lake Constance in Switzerland. This massive aircraft had 12 engines...in a tractor/pusher configuration.

The aircraft contained 3 decks, the upper deck had a cockpit for the pilots, navigator station, radio room and engine control room.

The main deck contained a smoking room, wet bar, dining salon, seats for 66 (convertible to sleeping berths) an electric galley, lavatories and cargo space.

The lower deck contained fuel tanks and 9 watertight compartments. (Shades of Titanic!!)

The pilots only had control of wing surfaces and the flight engineer had total control over engine operation. The engineer had to control the throttles and monitor 12 sets of gauges in his room, relying on voice commands from the pilots.

In 1930 the DO-X was scheduled for a transatlantic test flight to New York. The route was through Netherlands, UK, France, Spain and Portugal then down the west coast of Africa to Cape Verde for a crossing to Brazil.

Departing Friedrichshafen on 3 November, the DO-X made it successfully to Lisbon Portugal on the 29th, where it promptly caught fire and destroyed a wing section. 6 weeks were required to repair damages and the plane continued down the west coast of Africa, arriving in Cape Verde on 5 June 1931, after encountering more problems and delays.

From Cape Verde, the aircraft made its Atlantic crossing to Natal, Brazil at a harrowing height of 30 meters. The flight headed north and FINALLY reached New York in August...10 months after leaving Germany!! DO-X and its crew spent a further 9 months performing MORE maintenance as well as becoming a tourist attraction before spending 4 days making the Atlantic crossing back to Germany, where they received a heroes welcome!

Needless to say the German-US service never "took off" as planned and the aircraft was only used on local German flights in 1932. On a planned 1933 flight to Austria, Hungary and Turkey the tail section broke off in a landing accident, and was out of service for 3 years. It reappeared in Berlin at the German Aviation Museum where it resided until a bombing raid in WWII destroyed it.


















APS Circuit Books Report:

We have received a total of 16 books which will be at our March 2nd club meeting.



Dead Countries: Stamp Issuing Countries That No Longer Exist by Neil Becker

#16 Tibet

You might want to read up about the elusive Yeti and then pack your parka 'cause we are going to Tibet this month. For this visit we will look at the period from 1912 to 1951 when Tibet was an independent Theological Government headed by the 13th, then the 14th Dalai Lama. During that period Tibet's less than one million people were mostly isolated from the rest of the world.

Tibet's area at that time was around 463,000 square miles and consisted of a central plateau mostly surrounded by mountains. The livable areas were an average of 2 ½ miles above sea level, with the Himalayas, including Mt. Everest (29,032 ft.), taking up the western half of the country.

Due to its isolation and small population, Tibet had little need for a postal service until the 20th century. Prior to 1912 any outside mail was serviced with hand-overprinted stamps of India. With the new government, a postal division was established. However Tibet was never admitted to the U.P.U. (Universal Postal Union) so the issued stamps were only used locally. Five denominations of postage stamps picturing a snow lion in the center, on crude native paper, imperforate, were printed. Two higher denomination stamps (4 and 8 Tranka) were printed in a new design in 1914. (In 1920, the same designs were reprinted using a shiny enamel paint, instead of ink.)

The final design for Tibet appeared in 1933. Five stamps (Scott 9-13) were printed on thin white native paper and were pin-perforated. The following year the same denominations in different colors were printed, imperf. on heavy toned native paper. Finally, a 1 Sang high value was added to the first set (Scott #6) in 1950.



In 1951 Tibet was annexed by the Peoples Republic of China and remains under their authority today.

Fraudulent copies of all issues as well as fake cancellations are plentiful.

On page 8, you can see how a variety was created on Scott #18.



Scott # 18 sheet of twelve is shown with #18a ($25 \times 25 \text{ mm}$ instead of 24 x 24 mm) in the lower right corner, (position 12).
