Philatelic Ramblings:

Do you ever go to a postcard and paper ephemera show? It is surprising what you can find that may fit in with one of your stamp collections. Tomas, Michael and I went to the Wichita show this past weekend and I found all kinds of things. Even got a new idea for a one frame exhibit. I also found an interesting historical item that is philatelically related. See the picture at the right. Do you know what it is? I will talk about it during show-n-tell at our next meeting.

The next time one of these shows is in our area, I will try to place info in the newsletter. Unfortunately, I found out too late about this one. There also was one in Omaha recently. I found out from one of the dealers that while the postcard collectors group in the KC area quit doing their show sometime before or around COVID, that dealer and others took up the mantel and still mount the show at the Radisson in Lenexa each year. Usually in the spring sometime.



More shows around the country have either quit or pulled back drasti-

cally on what the show encompasses. Such as no exhibits. Many factors are to blame, cost of the venues, venues unwilling to book more than a few months in advance and local club members unwilling or unable to help with the planning and implementation of the show. If this continues, collectors will have a more difficult time finding material for their collections. Yes, you can go out online and buy lots of great stamps and covers but more common stamps that catalogue for the minimum are going to be harder to find. Why is that? Because a 25¢ stamp is sold at a loss by the time the seller pays the online platform their fees and then the Paypal fees. Also, if you just need that one 25¢ stamp, do you want to pay the shipping/mailing on that inexpensive stamp? Most online dealers charge a minimum of \$1 for shipping now because of postage costs. Many of the successful dealers that are left sell both online and at shows around the country. Without the shows, can they make it on just online sales?

Linn's Print Edition Ends:

Linn's Stamp News, which is the major weekly news publication of U.S. philately, is now only available as a digital (online) product. Their sister publication Scott Stamp Monthly will continue as both a digital and printed publication.

George W. Linn founded the publication in 1928. Amos Press, which also publishes the Scott Catalogues, currently owns and publishes Linn's.

Don Sundman Steps Down as Mystic President:

Mystic Stamp Company gets a new President of the company with Sundman remaining as Chairman of the Board. Tom Vasiliauskas becomes the new president of the company.

Mystic was founded 1923 and Maynard Sundman bought the company in 1974. For 50 years Don Sundman worked at Mystic and under his leadership became the largest stamp company in the nation.


Letter to the Editor:

RMS Carmania by Rick Karlslyst

One of my collections involves covers posted on ships at sea. This cover is from the British Ocean liner RMS Carmania, and she has a few unique stories buried in her history. She was built in 1904-5 and was a part of the Cunard Line of ships. RMS Carmania's maiden voyage was from Liverpool to New York on Dec 10 1905. In June of 1912 a fire broke out and she was out of service until Oct 1912.

In 1913, she assisted in the rescue of crew and passengers of the SS Vultano when the Vultano caught fire and her cargo exploded. The RMS Car-

mania was first on scene and directed the rescue operations of the 9 other ships who arrived to help. RMS Carmania's crew were presented with many awards for gallantry.

After war was declared in 1914, RMS Carmania was requisitioned by the war department, renamed HMS Carmania and armed with 8 naval guns. This made her an "Armed Merchant Cruiser" in British service.

On Sept 14, 1914, HMS Carmania met up with her "Doppelganger"! HMS Carmania met up with the SMS Cap Trafalgar off the coast of Brazil at a small island called Trindade Isle.

SMS Cap Trafalgar was an Imperial German Navy "Armed Auxiliary Cruiser" which looked VERY much like the Carmania. The Cap Trafalgar was launched in 1913 and in Hamburg-South American Line service for only 5 months before being requisitioned into German Navy service. To make a long story short, Carmania and Cap Trafalgar fought an intense battle which culminated in the sinking of the German vessel and severely damaging Carmania. She had been hit 79 times within 2 hours. HMS Carmania was flooded, and listing severely but remained afloat until help arrived and towed her to Brazil. From Brazil she was sent to Gibraltar for further repairs.

She had just participated in the FIRST battle between armed merchant vessels. Once repaired she resumed patrol duties and later participated in the Gallipoli landings.

HMS Carmania resumed her Cunard passenger duties in 1920. She was upgraded after the war and became a single class passenger ship. In 1931 she was placed on the sellers market and broken up in 1932.



needed to move on.



Dead Countries: Stamp Issuing Countries That No Longer Exist by Neil Becker

#22 Orange River Colony (Orange Free State)

By now, most readers are familiar with the enmity between the British and the Boers in the 19th Century in southern Africa. The number of Boers and other Europeans that had moved away from British rule into the area north of the Orange River had reached 15,000 by 1853. Even there, the British had been involved in different ways with administration of the area which lay west of Natal between the Vaal River to the north and the Orange River to the south, an area of about 50,000 square miles, known as the Orange Sovereignty. In 1854, the British decided to withdraw any involvement with the primarily Boer territory and drew up the Orange River Convention officially recognizing the independence of the country - ultimately named Orange Free State. The country existed until 1902 when, following the Second Boer War, it was annexed by the British and renamed Orange River Colony.

Orange Free State only issued one design on a set of 12 stamps between 1868 and 1900. A 1p red brown, 6p pale rose and 1sh orange were the first issues in 1868. Between 1877 and 1897 a total of 32 surcharged stamps were produced in denominations from 1/2d to 4d with as many as 6 different fonts involved with five of those issues. In 1899 the Boer War made it necessary for an undemoninated Military stamp to be issued for soldier's mail.



When Britain occupied the Orange Free State in 1900-01 they overprinted and surcharged these same stamps with "V.R.I." (Victoria Regina Imperatrix, Latin for Victoria, Queen and Empress). Many varieties of these issues exist, primarily with misplaced or missing periods in the overprint (as in #51, shown below.) 1900 and 1902 saw three stamps from Cape of Good Hope overprinted "ORANGE RIVER COLONY." in three lines. Also in 1902 two "V.R.I." stamps were given additional surcharges of 4p and 1sh; a 6p Orange Free State was given an "E.R.I." overprint and surcharge to honor the reigning King Edward that same year. Orange River Colony got their own stamps in 1903-4 with a set of 9 definitives, up to 5sh, on Wmk. 2 paper. Four denominations were reissued in1907-8 on Wmk. 3 paper. Orange River Colony became part of the Union of South Africa in 1910.

Below is a list of the elected offices and their duties:

The President shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Society, including the Board of Directors. He or she shall appoint all committees, with the approval of the Board of Directors, and be an ex officio member of all committees.

The First Vice President shall act for the President in case of temporary absence, and shall be responsible for the programs at Society meetings.

The Second Vice President shall be responsible for club auctions, and shall act for the First Vice President in case of temporary absence.

The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all regular and special meetings of the Society and present them for approval of the Society at the next regular meeting. He or she shall also keep the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors. A summary of the minutes will be sent to the Editor for insertion in the following month's newsletter (not to include the actual treasury balance), and shall be posted to the Society's website.

The Treasurer shall keep the financial records of the Society, making regular reports to the Society which shall be incorporated into the minutes. He or she shall be empowered to collect all dues and receipts and to pay the bills and disburse the funds of the Society. He or she shall be the custodian of the Bylaws of the Society.
