New Business:

1. At this time the meeting took place with Jeff Jax leading the group through the various Exhibits. Of the eight frames presented three of them were competitive. The judges presented the following awards from these three presentations.

Dead Countries: Stamp Issuing Countries That No Longer Exist by Neil Becker

#24 Transvaal

Transvaal means, literally, across the Vaal (River). That was the goal of many of the Boers who migrated north out of Cape Colony, starting in the 1830s. The country's size ranged from 74,000+ to over 110,000 square miles during its existence. Landlocked, it was bordered by (clock-wise): Mozambique, Natal, Orange Free State, Griqualand West, Bechuanaland and Rhodesia on the north.

The first organized government, established in 1852, was called South African Republic. The first postage stamps were printed in 1869 with three denominations issued both imperforate and rouletted. In 1871 a 3 pence in a similar design was introduced, followed in 1874 with a 6 pence stamp. Between 1870 and 1876 there were 41 local printings of both the 1871 and 1869 designs, both imperf and rouletted and with a variety of papers and colors.



The British annexed Transvaal in 1877. They overprinted the existing stamps with "V. 47, 1871 R." (meaning Victoria Regina) with "Transvaal" on a second line. Scott lists 47 different stamps bearing 4 styles of the overprint between 1877 and 1879. A new design featuring the side view bust of Queen Victoria appeared in 1878 in 6 denominations. A $\frac{1}{2}$ pence was added in 1880.





Following the 1881 British loss in First Boer War, the second South African Republic was reestablished as a free nation. The next year, the 4p Victoria stamp was overprinted "EEN PENNY" and in 1883 the 1869 and 1871 designs were reprinted with a 1p black, 3p red, 3p black on rose and 1sh green. A new design appeared in 1885 and was used up to 1894. A total of twelve different stamps were produced. Twelve stamps from that set were also given surcharges with new values in various ar-

rangements. 1894 brought another new design with 5 denominations. Thus far, all of the S.A.R. issues have had the coat-of-arms in the center



with different frames. However, the 1895-96 issues had only a change in the center – the wagon at the bottom of the coat-of-arms had two shafts in 1894, but was changed to a single pole on 9 different stamps. This set was repeated in 1896 with new colors and/or new denominations. 1895 also saw a revenue overprinted "Postage" and a stamp commemorating "Penny Postage". The last issues of the Republic were in 1901 during the Second Boer War when the government was forced to move to Pietersburg. Typeset provisional stamps were printed on colored paper, both imperf and perf. (a total of 37 different stamps) and were valid for about a month.

For the second time, in 1900 the British occupied the country and insisted on naming it Transvaal. The first 48 listings were stamps from the S.A.R. overprinted "V. R. I.", "V.R." and "E. R. I." (for Victoria or Edward). 1902-03 saw the bust of Edward VII on15 stamps with the name Transvaal at the bottom, on Crown and CA watermark paper. In the years 1904-09 13 stamps with similar colors were issued on Multiple Crown and CA paper. Finally, four of the previous denominations were issued in new colors between 1905-10.



In 1910 Transvaal was joined with the Union of South Africa as a province.

*Note: Many of Transvaal's (S.A.R.s) issues were extensively reprinted or forged. Be sure to read the fine print below the listings in the catalogue.

Lunar New Year-Year of the Snake

Forever First Class Rate One Design-Pane of 20 Issue Date January 14th First Day of Issue City: Boston, MA Print Quantity—21,000,000

Sixth stamp in the current Lunar New Year Series. Each entry has featured a mask that brings to mind the decorated masks used in the dragon or lion dances often performed at New Year Lunar Day parades. Designer Camille Chew constructed a three-dimensional snake mask out of hand printed paper. Then cut, scored and folded it into shape. Antonio Alcalá, an art director for the USPS, designed the stamp from a photograph of the mask by Sally Anderson-Bruce



Love (2025) Forever First Class Rate One Design-Pane of 20 Issue Date January 17th First Day of Issue City: Kutztown, PA Print Quantity—175,000,000

The new Love stamp celebrates the universal experience of love. The design is from original artwork of Keith Haring's (1958-1990) Untitled drawing from 1985.



Spiral Galaxy Priority Mail Flat Rate (\$9.85) One Design-Pane of 4 Issue Date January 21st First Day of Issue City: Big Sky, MT Print Quantity—not yet released

Issued in celebration of the continued exploration of deep space. An extremely high-definition image of a spiral galaxy 32 million light-years from Earth is represented on this new priority stamp.

Star Cluster Priority Mail Express Rate (\$30.45) One Design-Pane of 4 Issue Date January 21st First Day of Issue City: Big Sky, MT Print Quantity—not yet released

This stamp shows a star cluster approximately 1,000 light-years from Earth. The image used was captured by NASA's James Webb Space Telescope. Hidden within the cloud of celestial dust are floating brown dwarfs. Brown dwarfs are objects too small to be stars but large than most planets. Studying these brown dwarfs will help scientists explore how star-formation processes operate for very small masses.


Space is still a very popular topic in stamp collecting. The new priority and priority express stamps should increase in value over time. Especially when you consider fewer are issued, few dealers stock them deep and many collectors don't buy the higher denominations.



1794 Compass Rose

Global Forever International Rate One Design-Pane of 10 Issue Date January 24th First Day of Issue City: Peachtree Corners, GA Print Quantity—40,000,000

This colorful compass rose was drawn in a school geography notebook by Lucia Wadsworth, the aunt of poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, when she was only 10 years old. USPS Art Director, Greg Breeding, designed the stamp.



Allen Toussaint (Black Heritage Series)

Forever First Class Rate One Design-Pane of 20 Issue Date January 30th First Day of Issue City: New Orleans, LA Print Quantity—30,000,000

This is the 48th stamp in the series and honors Allen Toussaint (1938-2015). He was a virtuoso pianist, singer, songwriter, composer, arranger and producer responsible for scores of hits across multiple genres. He was a producer for Dr. John's hit, "Right Place, Wrong Time" and "Lady Marmalade" by Labelle. Toussaint collaborated with Paul McCartney and Wings for their hit album Venus and Mars and played on the song "Rock Show". Glen Campbell's hit "Southern Nights was written by Toussaint. The song was number one on the pop, country and adult contemporary charts in 1975.
